

I hope this edition finds you all well ensconced in your warm abodes awaiting the latest updates in our every evolving field. You will find all you need to keep up to date with the latest developments in zoning, tax, OPRA, civil rights, and every other field touching our practice. As always, I on behalf of the editors hope you find this informative and helpful.

As some of you are aware, and if you don't know now you know, there is fast-tracked legislation pending in Trenton to create a whole new process for setting affordable housing obligations. This bill, titled A4, has several sponsors and as of this writing has been approved by the State Assembly (largely along party lines). It is now before the Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee without a scheduled date for hearing.

The bill would allow a central committee of learned former jurists to set each municipality's affordable housing need numbers. Afterwards, the municipality is granted the opportunity to argue that the number is incorrect. The bill sets forth very short timeframes for objections to be registered and then heard. On its face, the proposal appears at best unworkable and at worse sets an unreachably high goal. Choose any one of the contested matters from the last round and you will quickly see how unrealistic this bill's aspirations are.

NJILGA has been keeping an eye on this and has raised these concerns among others. However, it appears that the State Legislature and the Governor are committed to this bill. I would highly recommend that you read A4 and digest its potential impact for your clients.

Again, we encourage you to consider submitting an article that qualifies for the \$1,000 Walter T. Wittman Prize in writing.
